



THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Acts 1:6-14

Lector When the apostles had come together, they asked Jesus, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

Second Lesson: 1 Peter 4:12-14; 5:6-11

Lector Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that is taking place among you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice insofar as you are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may also be glad and shout for joy when his glory is revealed. If you are reviled for the name of Christ, you are blessed, because the spirit of glory, which is the Spirit of God, is resting on you.

Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, so that he may exalt you in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you. Discipline yourselves, keep alert. Like a roaring lion your adversary the devil prowls around, looking for someone to devour. Resist him, steadfast in your faith, for you know that your brothers and sisters in all the world are undergoing the same kinds of suffering. And after you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, support, strengthen, and establish you. To him be the power forever and ever. Amen.

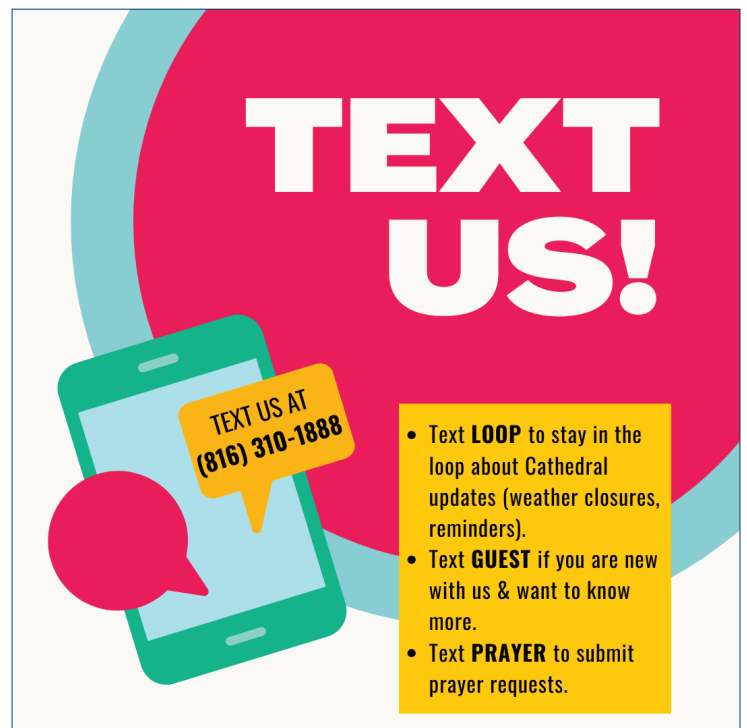

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Patient Waiting

"To the Ends of the Earth" Illumination (Acts 1:6-14)

This, the last Sunday of the Easter Season, confronts a liminal moment in the church's life – Christ has left but Pentecost has not yet arrived. This calls for us to consider how the church should navigate "in-between" times. The Acts reading admonishes that instead of wallowing in nostalgia wishing for a return to the past, we should commit ourselves to prayer in preparation for the mission ahead. Through the collect we pray that God would not "leave us comfortless, but send us his Holy Spirit to strengthen us, and exalt us to that place where our Savior Christ has gone before..."

The Gospel reading emphasizes the unity of the Trinity and extends the same desire for unity to the church as well. The Epistle reading highlights the church's sacred calling to continue Christ's mission through being a witness of God's love wherever it is located, even in the face of adversity and suffering. In both Acts and John, prayer is emphasized as the Christian community's central activity. When confronted with uncertainty, the apostles turned to prayer and so should we.

Today's focal illumination, "To the Ends of the Earth," knits together the unity and chaos of creation, God's presence through his followers, and the church's abiding witness to the resurrection. In Acts 1:8 Jesus declares the spread of the Gospel (God's offer of redemption for all humanity) to be the heart of the church's mission. This mission is repeated in Acts 13:47. At the end of the book of Acts (where this illumination is located) Paul has reached Rome, the center of the civilized world as conceived by the dominant culture of his day and from which the Gospel is being spread to the known world. Following this, the continuing work of witness is left to the church through its ongoing mission.

In this illumination the earth is portrayed suspended in space – the first handmade Bible to depict the earth as seen from space. It accentuates the magnitude of the church's task as well as the earth's minuteness in relation to the vastness of the universe. Note the comet in the sky above the earth which is used to bridge the gap between

ancient biblical prophecy and modern scientific understanding, symbolizing God's active, ongoing role in creation and history. In addition, observe the swirling mass of a galaxy. The cross pattern from the Gospel and Acts volume's carpet pages is stenciled over this dynamic universe. The interlocking circles of gold filigree signify the presence of God throughout the creation.

Jesus' prayer in today's Gospel reading reminds us of the importance that prayer, love, and unity have for the church's witness. He seems to imply here that if we accept divisiveness, bitterness, and discord as acceptable standards for Christian community then the world will not know what it needs to know about God. In the absence of that knowledge, it will believe falsehoods regarding God's presence and activity in the world. It will conclude that the Bible's message is a sham and that the church's claims are fraudulent. How does this lectionary emphasis speak to you? How might you describe your own experiences of sharing God's revelation? What have those experiences revealed to you?

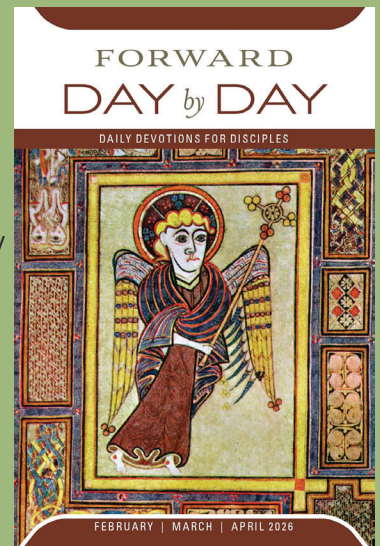
