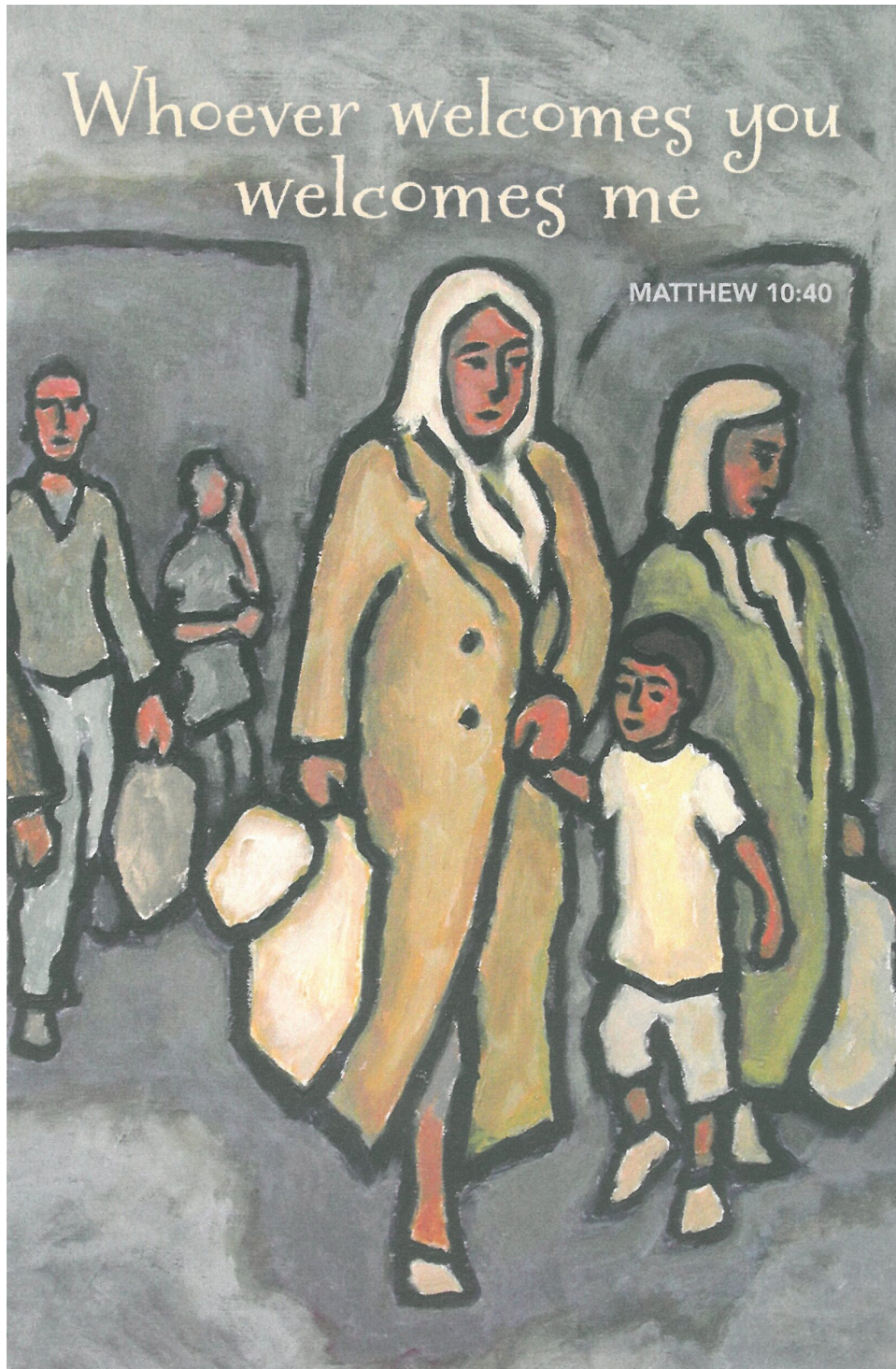

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Genesis 22:1-14

Lector God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together.

When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place "The Lord will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided."

Second Lesson: Romans 6:12-23

Lector Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

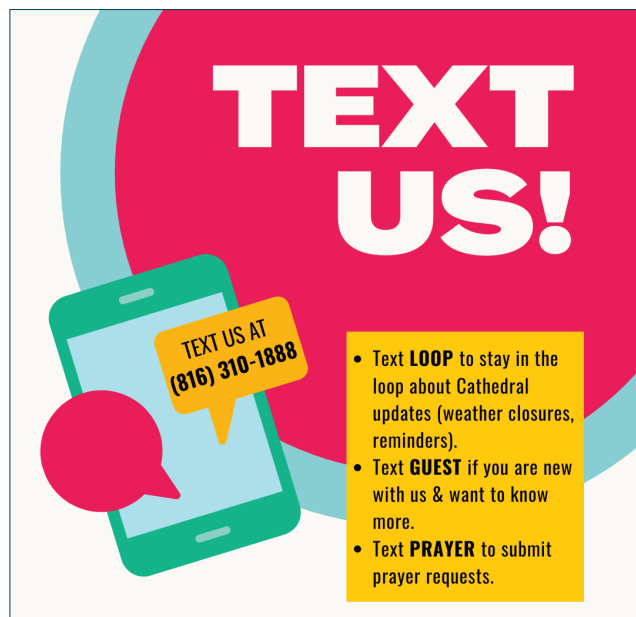

Today's Focus: St. John's Bible Illumination

Christian Obedience, Discernment & Hospitality Sacrificial Lamb image in "Abraham and Sarah" Illumination (Genesis 22)

Lectionary themes for today focus on radical obedience, spiritual discernment, and Christian hospitality. The Genesis 22 reading is among the most challenging of the Bible's texts for biblical theologians both to interpret and to reconcile with later commands from God condemning human sacrifice. While none of the proposed solutions has proven to be fully satisfactory, it is significant that the language used to describe Isaac is similar to that spoken by God the Father about Jesus (compare Genesis 22:2 with Matthew 3:17 and 17:5). What does this say to you about the nature of God? In light of such challenge, the Psalm 13 reading reminds us of the freedom we have to be totally honest with God, even when we hold serious doubts and hard questions. The Gospel and Epistle readings emphasize the importance of Christian hospitality and love. The complementary Old Testament text from Jeremiah 28 centers on the conflict between authentic and false teaching highlighting the importance of well-grounded spiritual discernment, the cost of discipleship, and communal hope.

The "Abraham and Sarah" illumination includes a black and gray figure in the lower right. This image represents a sacrificial lamb which in this context is often identified by Christian and Jewish traditions as the ram used in substitution for Isaac. The depiction is fertile with meanings and serves as a visual bridge connecting Old Testament obedience to New Testament redemption.

The sacrificial image placed at the base of the family tree (a menorah) visually ties Abraham and Sarah's offspring to the foundational covenant of sacrifice, faith, and divine promise. The abiding symbolic legacy of the "lamb" in Genesis 22 includes the qualities of innocence, obedience, and atonement. Consequently, it reminds the viewer of the cost of faith and the divine provision needed to carry out God's promise. This motif foreshadows Jesus as the "Lamb of God." In the same manner that God provided a substitute for Isaac on Mount Moriah, the sacrificial lamb represents the ultimate substitutionary offering made by Christ.

Today's focal texts and illumination remind us that life is complex. It confronts us with a broad spectrum of joys, challenges, certainties, perplexities, triumphs, failures, insights, unknowns, and more. People deal with this complexity in varying ways ranging from attempts to ignore the ambiguities to employing rigidly legalistic systems that seek to eliminate all ambiguity. Today's lectionary lessons remind us of our need to walk with God amid life's ambiguities and contradictions. In Christ we experience God's love and his sometimes inexplicable guidance (discernment) for navigating what to us may seem to be life's incomprehensible realities.

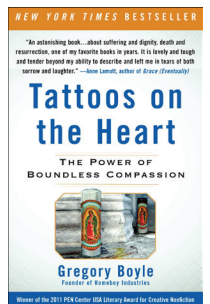
GHTC's Virtual Cafe • 7:30 a.m. • Zoom
