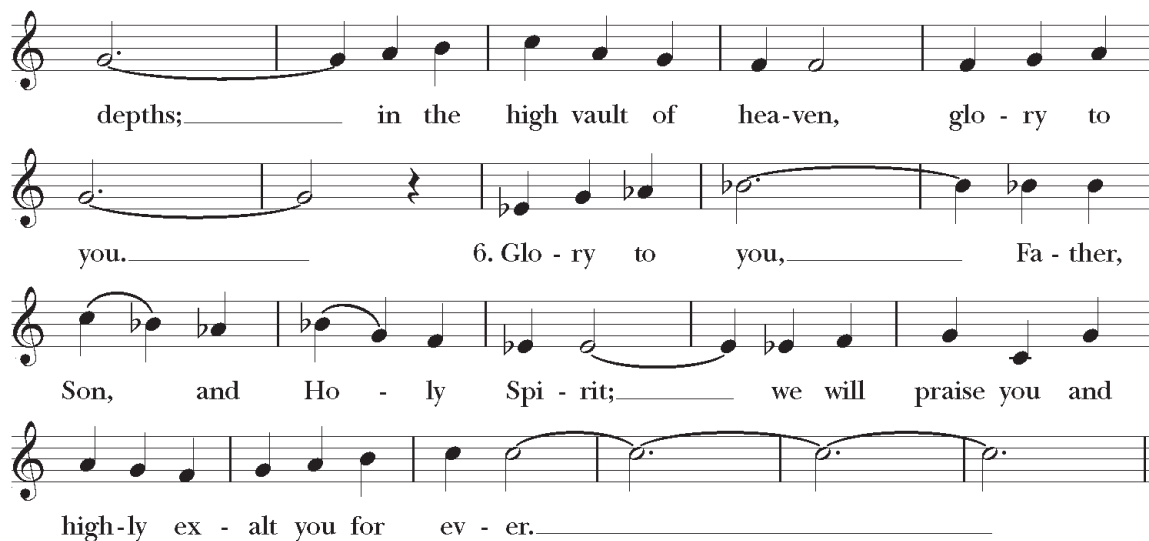

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Genesis 24:34-38, 42-49, 58-67

Lector The servant said to Laban, "I am Abraham's servant. The Lord has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; he has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. And Sarah my master's wife bore a son to my master when she was old; and he has given him all that he has. My master made me swear, saying, 'You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live; but you shall go to my father's house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son.'

"I came today to the spring, and said, 'O Lord, the God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, "Please give me a little water from your jar to drink," and who will say to me, "Drink, and I will draw for your camels also" —let her be the woman whom the Lord has appointed for my master's son.'

"Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water jar on her shoulder; and she went down to the spring, and drew. I said to her, 'Please let me drink.' She quickly let down her jar from her shoulder, and said, 'Drink, and I will also water your camels.' So I drank, and she also watered the camels. Then I asked her, 'Whose daughter are you?' She said, 'The daughter of Bethuel, Nahor's son, whom Milcah bore to him.' So I put the ring on her nose, and the bracelets on her arms. Then I bowed my head and worshiped the Lord, and blessed the Lord, the God of my master Abraham, who had led me by the right way to obtain the daughter of my master's kinsman for his son. Now then, if you will deal loyally and truly with my master, tell me; and if not, tell me, so that I may turn either to the right hand or to the left."

And they called Rebekah, and said to her, “Will you go with this man?” She said, “I will.” So they sent away their sister Rebekah and her nurse along with Abraham’s servant and his men. And they blessed Rebekah and said to her, “May you, our sister, become thousands of myriads; may your offspring gain possession of the gates of their foes.” Then Rebekah and her maids rose up, mounted the camels, and followed the man; thus the servant took Rebekah, and went his way. Now Isaac had come from Beer-lahai-roi, and was settled in the Negeb. Isaac went out in the evening to walk in the field; and looking up, he saw camels coming. And Rebekah looked up, and when she saw Isaac, she slipped quickly from the camel, and said to the servant, “Who is the man over there, walking in the field to meet us?” The servant said, “It is my master.” So she took her veil and covered herself. And the servant told Isaac all the things that he had done. Then Isaac brought her into his mother Sarah’s tent. He took Rebekah, and she became his wife; and he loved her. So Isaac was comforted after his mother’s death.

Lector I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me.

So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

Presider

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

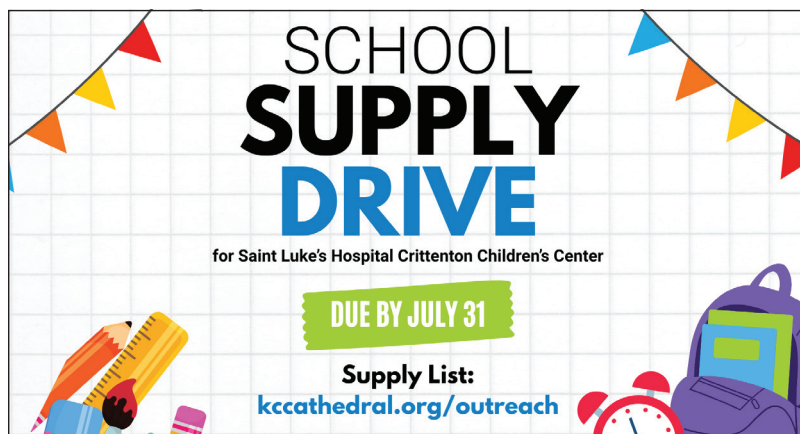

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

The Human Condition and Divine Grace

"Triumphal Entry" Illumination (Zechariah 9:9-12)

The lectionary readings for the Sixth Sunday after Pentecost address the struggles of the human condition, finding rest amid those struggles, the humble nature of Christ, and God's abundant grace. The Old Testament reading from Zechariah highlights the theme of a victorious yet humble king who brings peace to the world's nations and freedom to those enslaved. In the Gospel reading Jesus offers his "easy" yoke to those who are weary and heavy-laden. This is an invitation to join him in humble discipleship as an alternative to the exhausting expectations of the world. The Epistle reading from Romans describes the human dilemma of wanting to do good while repeatedly falling into the sin we hate. This offers a penetrating exploration of the human need for divine rescue. Finally, the alternative Old Testament reading from Genesis narrating the marriage of Isaac and Rebekah treats divine providence and enduring human relationships. These lectionary themes converge in today's Collect where we pray for God's grace to love both God and our neighbor.

In the context of Israel's history, it is significant that the Zechariah text emphasizes a global rather than a parochial perspective. After Israel had lived in Babylonian captivity for about fifty years, a power shift brought the Persian Empire to victory over Babylonia. In 538 BCE, the subjected Jews were allowed to return to their decimated homeland. The few Jews who chose to return faced what seemed like impossible hardships in their efforts to survive in this devastated land. Amid these circumstances, Zechariah prophesied a vision of hope regarding the future, albeit one that was far different than that sought by the returnees. Zechariah's vision was one of national humility, not revenge and domination. It imagined a king riding upon a young donkey rather than upon a

regal stallion. The envisioned kingdom was peaceable and universal, not exclusive and ethnocentric.

The "Rejoice" illumination highlights the text of Zechariah 9:9, "Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he." But as the image conveys, this is not a vision of the conquering military leader that many returned exiles expected. Instead, it portrays this victorious king as a suffering servant. Illuminator Hazel Dolby depicts the "king" riding on a sad-looking donkey with its head bowed low. Palm trees line his route. The image of a city appears in the upper left-hand corner of the depiction. Both elements serve as indicators of an eschatological dimension at work. God intends to inaugurate a new Jerusalem whose existence is above and beyond the coercive and corrupting influences of earthly powers.

The Bible's overarching story tells us that God created the entire cosmos. In Genesis, God promised to bless "all the families of the earth" through the obedient action of Abraham and Sarah. In Revelation, God gathers people from "every nation, tribe, people, and language." As God was not exclusively the God of the ancient Jews, neither is he exclusively the God of any one nation or race of people today. God is the father of "every family in heaven and on earth" (Ephesians 3:15). Does this reminder from today's lectionary readings fill you with hope for the future or does it disappoint you? Why?

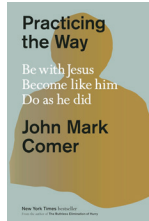

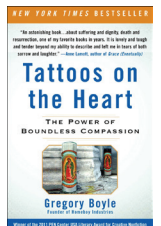
