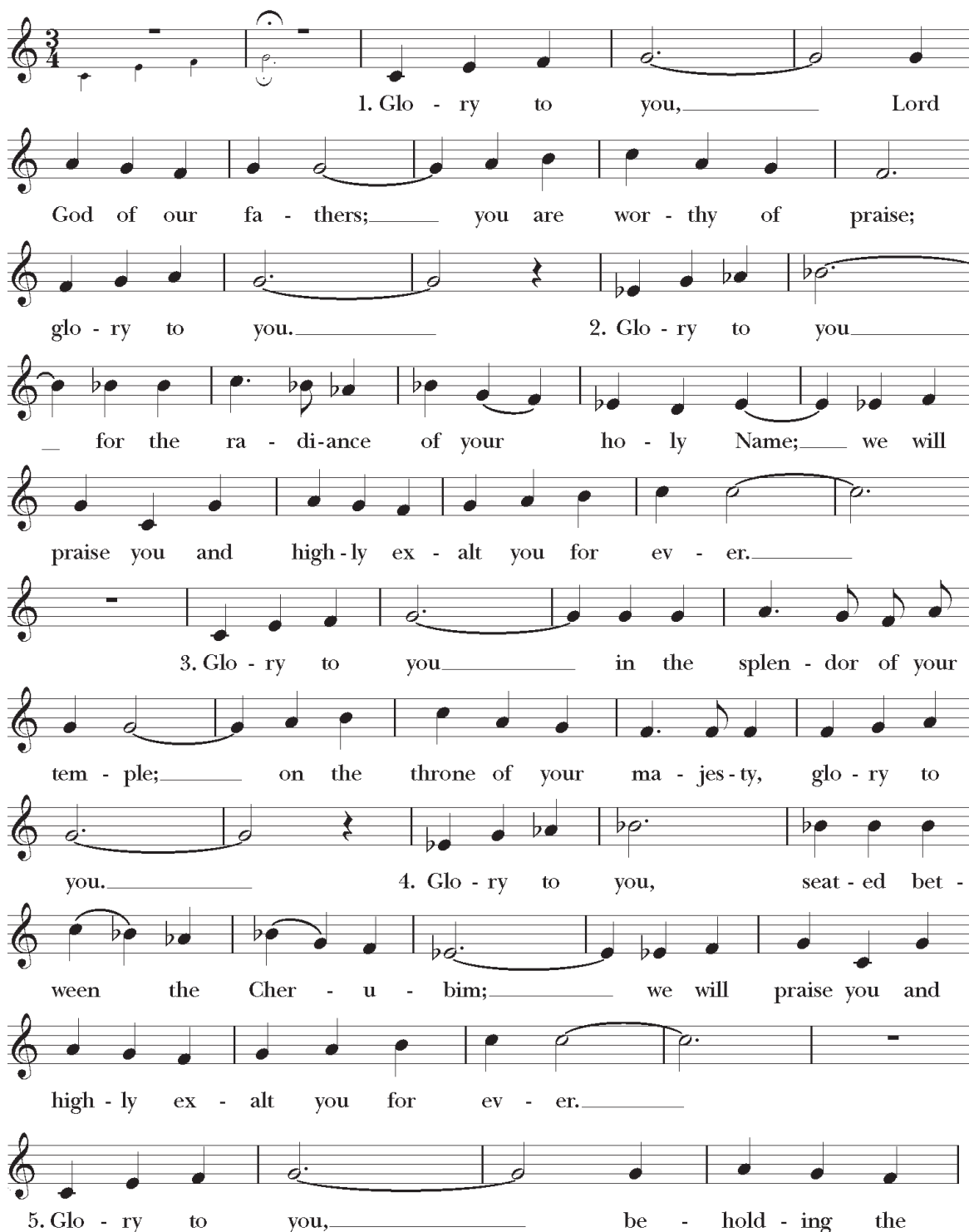

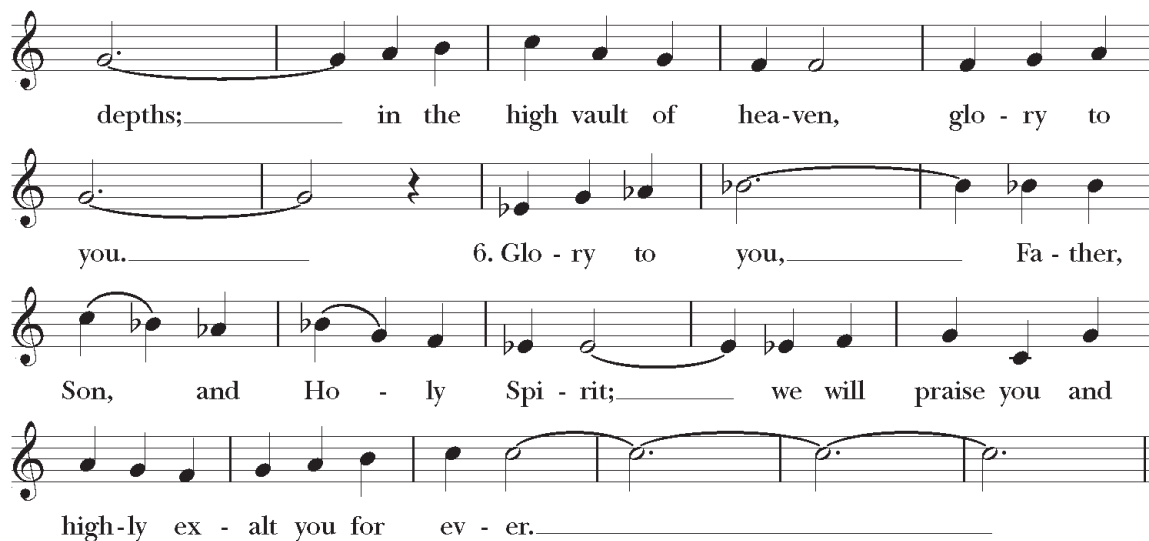

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Genesis 29:15-28

Lector Laban said to Jacob, “Because you are my kinsman, should you therefore serve me for nothing? Tell me, what shall your wages be?” Now Laban had two daughters; the name of the elder was Leah, and the name of the younger was Rachel. Leah’s eyes were lovely, and Rachel was graceful and beautiful. Jacob loved Rachel; so he said, “I will serve you seven years for your younger daughter Rachel.” Laban said, “It is better that I give her to you than that I should give her to any other man; stay with me.” So Jacob served seven years for Rachel, and they seemed to him but a few days because of the love he had for her.

Then Jacob said to Laban, “Give me my wife that I may go in to her, for my time is completed.” So Laban gathered together all the people of the place, and made a feast. But in the evening he took his daughter Leah and brought her to Jacob; and he went in to her. (Laban gave his maid Zilpah to his daughter Leah to be her maid.) When morning came, it was Leah! And Jacob said to Laban, “What is this you have done to me? Did I not serve with you for Rachel? Why then have you deceived me?” Laban said, “This is not done in our country—giving the younger before the firstborn. Complete the week of this one, and we will give you the other also in return for serving me another seven years.” Jacob did so, and completed her week; then Laban gave him his daughter Rachel as a wife.

Second Lesson: Romans 8:26-39

Lector	The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified. What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Gospeller Jesus put before the crowds another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."
 He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened."
 "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field."
 "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it."
 "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and caught fish of every kind; when it was full, they drew it ashore, sat down, and put the good into baskets but threw out the bad. So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."
 "Have you understood all this?" They answered, "Yes." And he said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old."

Presider We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. 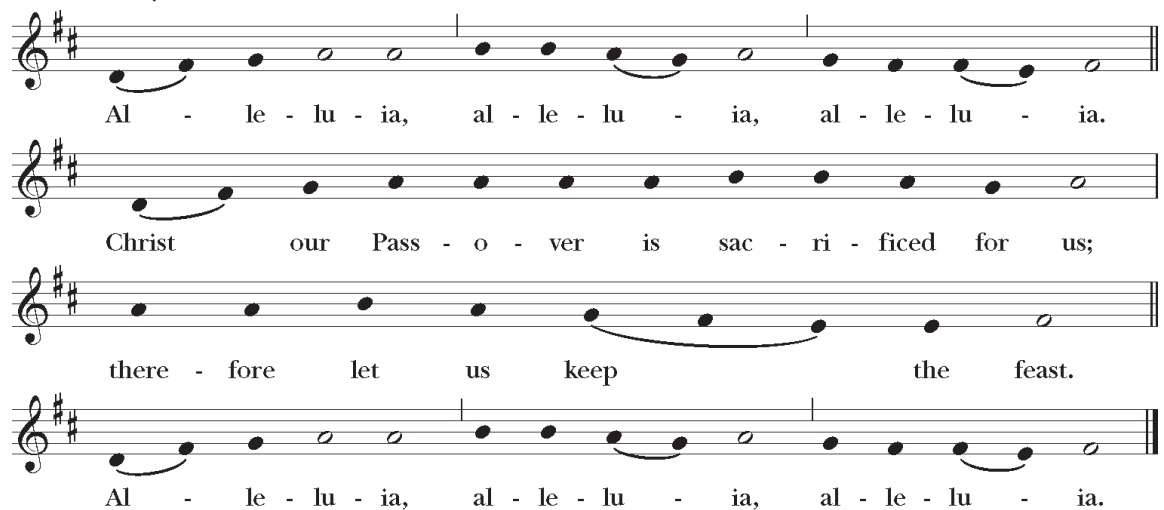

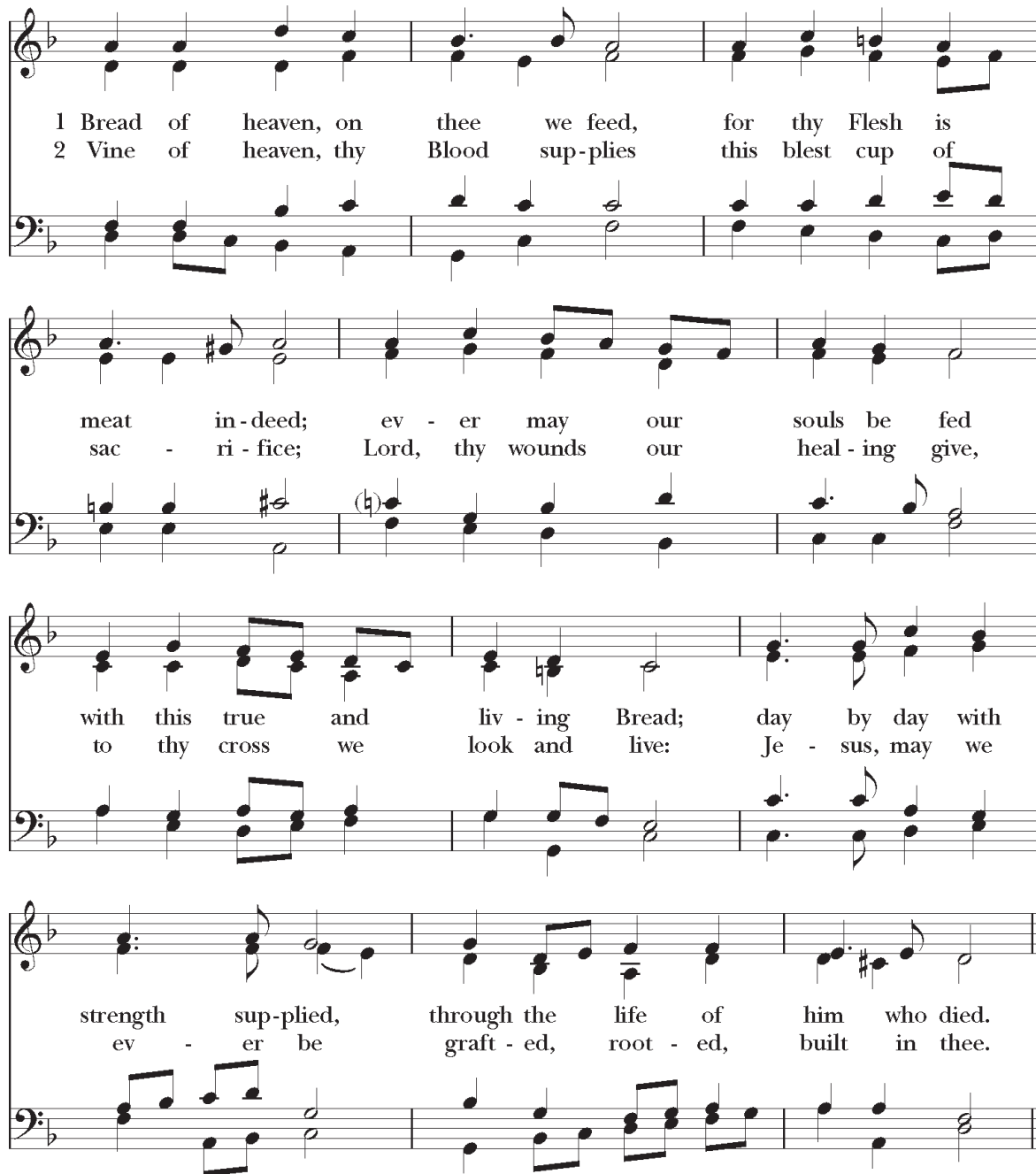

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Divine Wisdom, Value of God's Kingdom, & The Spirit's Intercession

"Wisdom of Solomon" Illumination (1 Kings 3)

Lectionary themes for the Ninth Sunday after Pentecost highlight divine wisdom, the incomparable value of the kingdom of heaven, and assurance that the Holy Spirit is interceding for us in our weakness. In the 1 Kings reading, King Solomon asks God for the gift of a "listening heart" rather than for power or wealth. In so doing he models servant-leadership rather than self-serving ambition as his administrative aspiration for his new role as king. The Gospel reading emphasizes the hidden value of the kingdom. Mustard seed, yeast, and pearls are used to illustrate how God's kingdom often starts in "hidden" ways but grows to encompass the whole world with its life-changing values. The Epistle reading offers assurance that the Holy Spirit intercedes for us in our struggles, even when we are so distraught that we don't know how to pray. Today's Collect guides our focus toward God as the protector who leads us through earthly trials, so we do not lose sight of things eternal in the process.

One lesson drawn from this *Lectio Divina* is that true Christian leadership (whether vocational or not) starts with vulnerability, self-awareness, and reliance on God's grace rather than on personal ego. The 1 Kings narrative describes Solomon's request to be given a "listening heart." Solomon seeks the kind of relationship that nurtures receptivity to God's wisdom as a foundation for ruling justly. He desires to be able to discern between good and evil in order to effectively govern God's people.

Unfortunately, the broader narrative of 1 Kings reveals that Solomon eventually succumbed to the seductions of wealth and power. This serves as a warning to us regarding our ongoing need for spiritual vigilance and faithful stewardship of vocational motivation.

In today's *Visio Divina*, Hazel Dolby's "Wisdom of Solomon" illumination gets at the heart of Solomon's wisdom. Drawing upon the famous case of two women claiming maternity over a single live baby, Solomon decrees that the baby be cut in two with each woman receiving half. The ruse works and reveals the woman who actually is the mother. In the illumination, a light sharply divides the darkness in a manner reminiscent of the sword Solomon called for in this judicial case. This sword is made of gold and silver. In Saint John's Bible silver is used to represent wisdom as a complementary principle to the divine presence that is represented by gold. In actuality, illuminated manuscripts seldom used genuine silver since it would oxidize over time and turn black. Medieval illuminators tended to employ substitutes for actual silver. The Saint John's Bible utilizes platinum as its silver substitute.

The effect of this illumination, together with the highlighted verse on the lower right, is to visualize how Solomon's wisdom (i.e., "listening heart") enabled him to take right action decisively and quickly. Repeatedly in history we read of unwise rulers who rush to wrong judgment and cause greater harm and worse injustice. Based on these readings, how would you define true wisdom? Can you think of an instance when someone demonstrated wisdom? How did it make you feel?

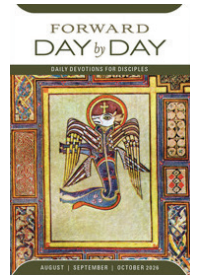

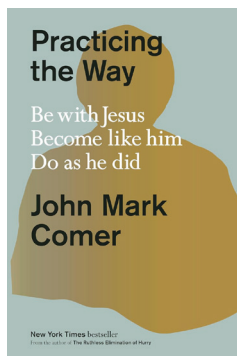
Practicing the Way
