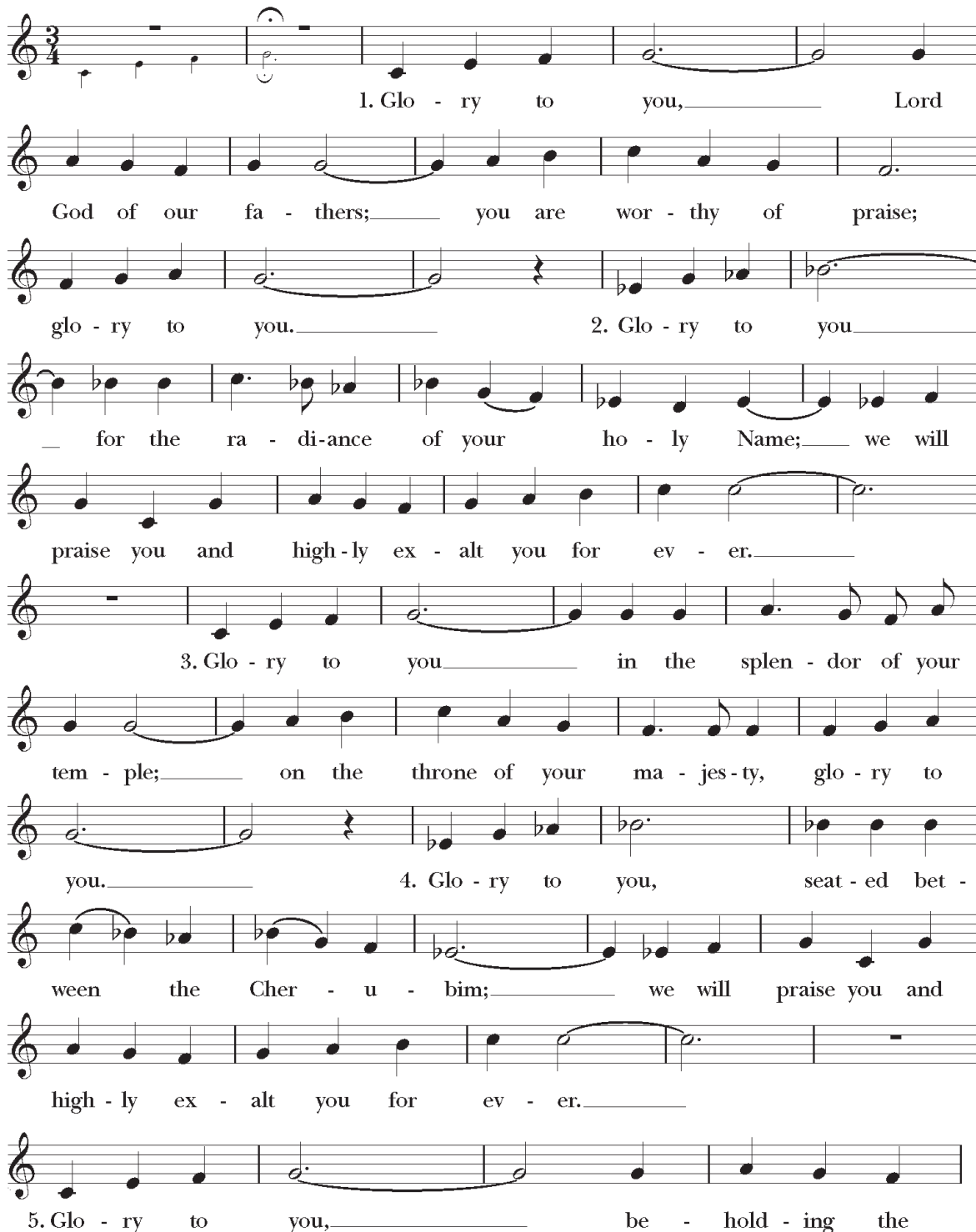

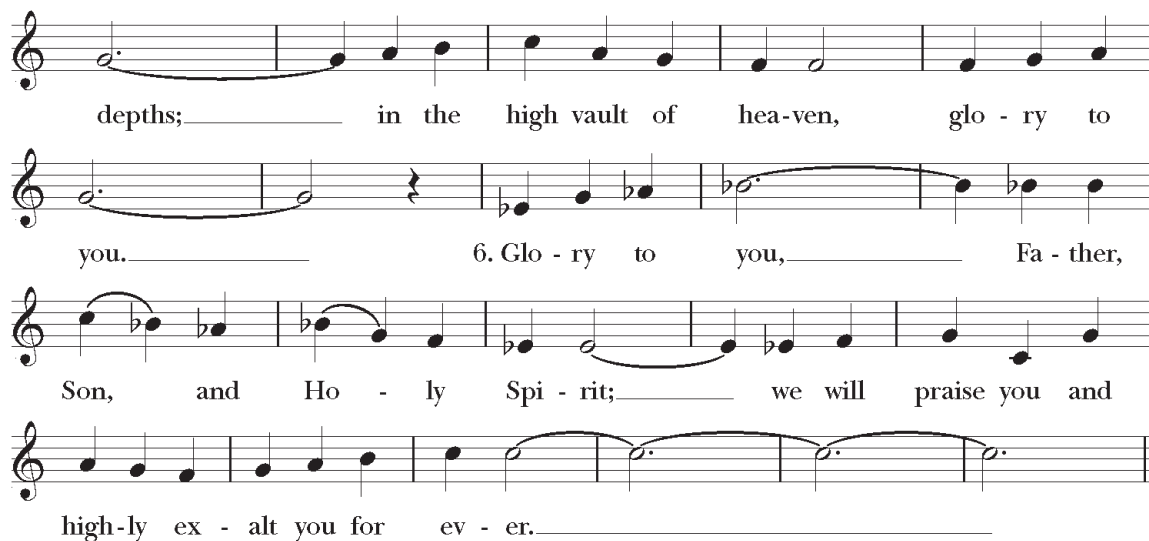

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Exodus 12:1-14

Lector The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Second Lesson: Romans 13:8-14

Lector	Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law. Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires. The Word of the Lord.

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. Presider

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

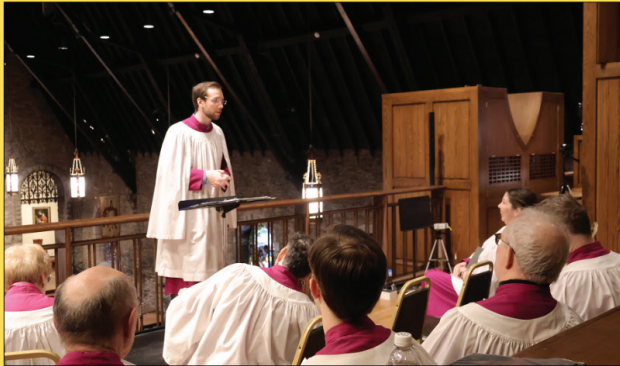

Cathedral Kids

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Communal Accountability, Restorative Justice & The Shape of Christian Love "Woman Taken in Adultery" Illumination (John 8 relating to today's themes)

Today's lectionary readings address three interrelated theological themes. First is the duty of the watchman described in Ezekiel 33, introducing the theme of corporate responsibility. The faith community is called to teach truth, warn against destructive choices, and remember that God desires the redemption, not the destruction of those trapped in spiritually detrimental lifestyles. The Gospel reading outlines a strategy for handling interpersonal conflict and sin within the church. Instead of public shaming or silent resentment, Jesus emphasizes direct private engagement, progressive accountability, and the goal of restoring relationship. Finally, the Epistle reading highlights love as the fulfillment of the Law – "love your neighbor as yourself." The complementary Old Testament reading from Exodus 12 unites these themes into one narrative that speaks of liberation and new beginnings, preparation and trust, sacramental health, and communal spirituality.

The Apostle Paul articulates the goal that motivates many people to invest their lives in Christian community – love. We seek to give and receive love that creates a harmonious and supportive community. However, likely every person who has been part of a faith community for any length of time has encountered occasional dark human motivations even there, possibly especially within ourselves. Today's readings acknowledge this reality and offer guidance for constructively addressing it.

Our *Visio Divina* comes from an illumination on John 8, a complementary text that also builds upon these themes. The "Woman Taken in Adultery" illumination employs an Orthodox icon artistic style to convey its message. Careful observation of changes between the two panels tells the viewers what they need to know about the story.

In the upper panel a temple official holds the Hebrew word for adultery, extending it outside the frame. Here he uses God's word as a weapon – the word in one hand and a stone in the other. We become implicated in this action as the word and stone seem offered to us who stand outside the depiction. Jesus bends away, distancing himself from those figures. The woman stands center stage in fear, pleading.

In the lower panel only Jesus and the woman remain. Her face and gestures convey repentance and gratitude.

On the ground are piles of stones which have been discarded. The curtain which was closed in the upper panel is now open and Jesus invites her to enter the golden hallway. The woman who was judged, shamed, and threatened finds forgiveness and is accepted into God's community.

Do you find yourself identifying more with the actions of the upper panel or the lower one? With which figures do you most identify? What applications does this illumination suggest to you for Christian communities struggling to be faithful to God's intent amid the challenges of the societies we live in today?

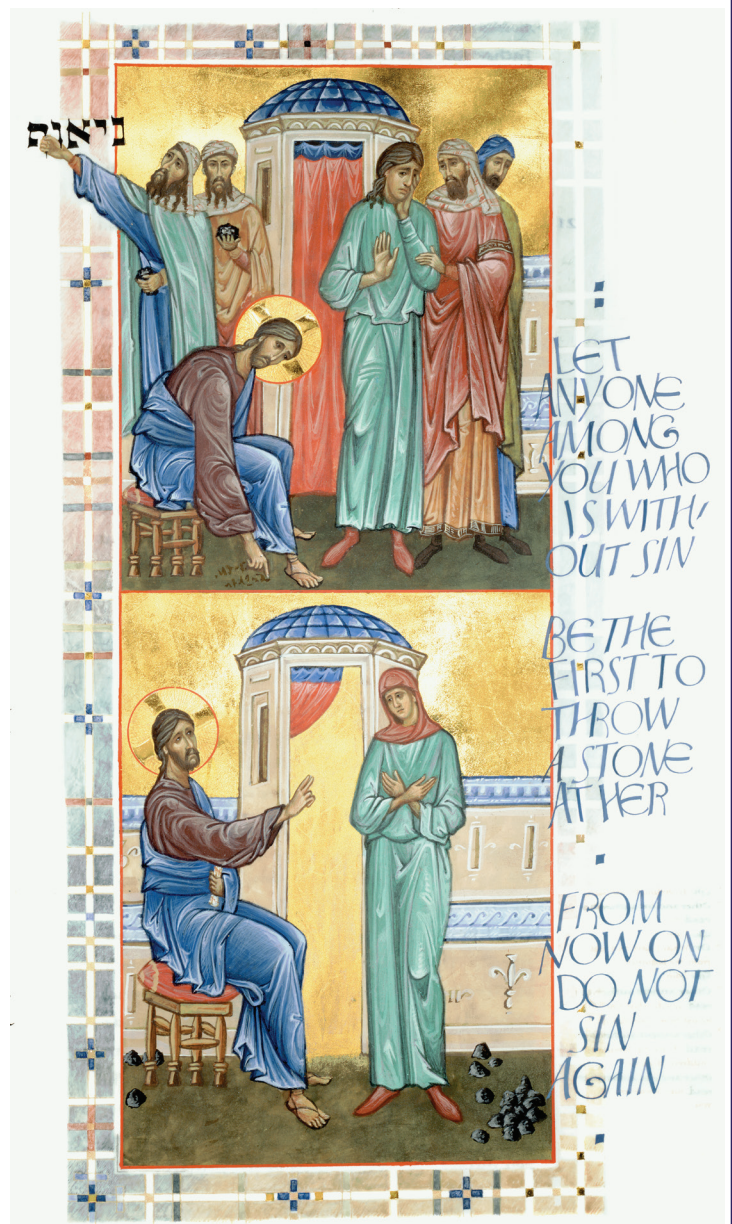
