THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Exodus 14:19-31

Lector The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night.

Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians said, "Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt."

Then the Lord said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers." So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea; not one of them remained. But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left.

Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great work that the Lord did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

Second Lesson: Romans 14:1-12

Lector Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God.

We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.

Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. For it is written,

“As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me,
and every tongue shall give praise to God.”

So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

* THE HOLY GOSPEL: Matthew 18:21-35

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Gospeller Peter came and said to Jesus, “Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?” Jesus said to him, “Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

“For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, ‘Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.’ And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, ‘Pay what you owe.’ Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, ‘Have patience with me, and I will pay you.’ But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, ‘You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?’ And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.”

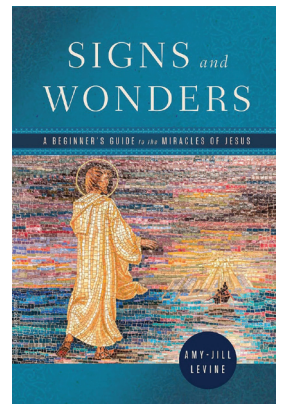

The Music of Fanny Hensel with pianist Daniel Peycke

September 25 | 7 p.m. | Cathedral Nave

Join pianist Daniel Peycke for an evening devoted to the remarkable music of Fanny Hensel, one of the most compelling composer-pianists of the Romantic era. Though much of Hensel's work remained unpublished during her lifetime, her music reveals imagination, depth, and a distinctive voice that continues to gain recognition today. This recital invites listeners to discover the beauty and brilliance of her piano writing in the resonant setting of the Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral Nave. The concert is free; donations are welcomed.

Daniel Peycke received BM and MM degrees in piano performance from UMKC. He lives in Raytown with his wife and three children, working as a collaborative pianist, teacher, and church musician.

Fanny Mendelssohn Hensel (1805–1847) composed more than 450 works, including piano music, songs, chamber music, and larger vocal works. In the final year of her life, she began publishing under her own name after some early works had appeared in collections associated with her brother, Felix Mendelssohn.



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Divine Deliverance, Radical Forgiveness, & the Nature of God's Mercy

"Dinner at the Pharisee's Home" Illumination (Luke 7:36-50 relating to themes of Forgiveness)

Today's lectionary readings focus on three themes: divine deliverance, radical forgiveness, and the boundary-crossing nature of God's mercy. The Exodus text highlights God's positioning his presence between the Hebrew and Egyptian camps to protect the vulnerable, thereby turning a place of death into one of liberation. The alternative Old Testament reading in Genesis 50 narrates Joseph's forgiving his brothers for their evil deed of selling him into Egyptian slavery. His redemptive response to his brothers emphasizes how God works through messy, broken human actions to give life rather than to exact retribution. In the Gospel reading Jesus tells the parable of an unforgiving servant to highlight the contrast between God's infinite mercy and our tendency to be unforgiving toward those who offend us. The Epistle reading challenges the Christian community to stop judging one another and reminds us that we must all stand before God's judgment seat.

These themes are integrated in today's *Visio Divina* by means of an application that visualizes how God's abundant love and forgiveness tend to disrupt the orderly and predictable patterns of life that we generally prefer. The "Dinner at the Pharisee's House" illumination depicts the extravagance of a woman who anoints Jesus' feet with a perfume worth a year's wages. Jesus often was criticized by the religious establishment of his day for fraternizing too freely

with sinners. Today's illumination highlights how this practice tended to introduce chaos into culturally familiar settings. Illuminator Donald Jackson depicts this by the messy, haphazard array placed within the meticulously neat household. A heavy black line dividing the scene suggests the chasm that exists between the world of this "sinful woman" and that of the Pharisees. Jesus' words in the middle of the illumination mediate between the chaos brought about by the woman and the task she has come to accomplish – express extravagant love in response to the extravagant forgiveness and acceptance she has experienced. Her actions remind us that extravagance is reciprocal.

Near the top of the black dividing line is a circle inscribed with a cross. Poised over this scene, this cross feature invites the questions: "What is holiness?" and "How does holiness relate to forgiveness?" The woman in this panel is unconventional, with green and pink hair and dressed eccentrically. The world she is disrupting is represented by the white scarf displaying

Hebrew words indicative of temple worship and sacrifice. Here another boundary is exposed – the barrier between mere habitual religious practice and living faith that is infused with abundant love and forgiveness. Through this event Jesus seizes the opportunity to convey the message that divine mercy is chaotic. Such mercy disrupts the world of empty orderliness.

Today's focal illumination reminds us that when God breaks into history the world in its usual state is disrupted. What do you think distinguishes the left side of this panel from the right? What unites them? Do you prefer the tidy household or the disruptive intensity of extravagant forgiveness and love? Can you recall moments when your life was disrupted by this type of forgiveness?

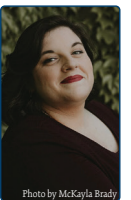

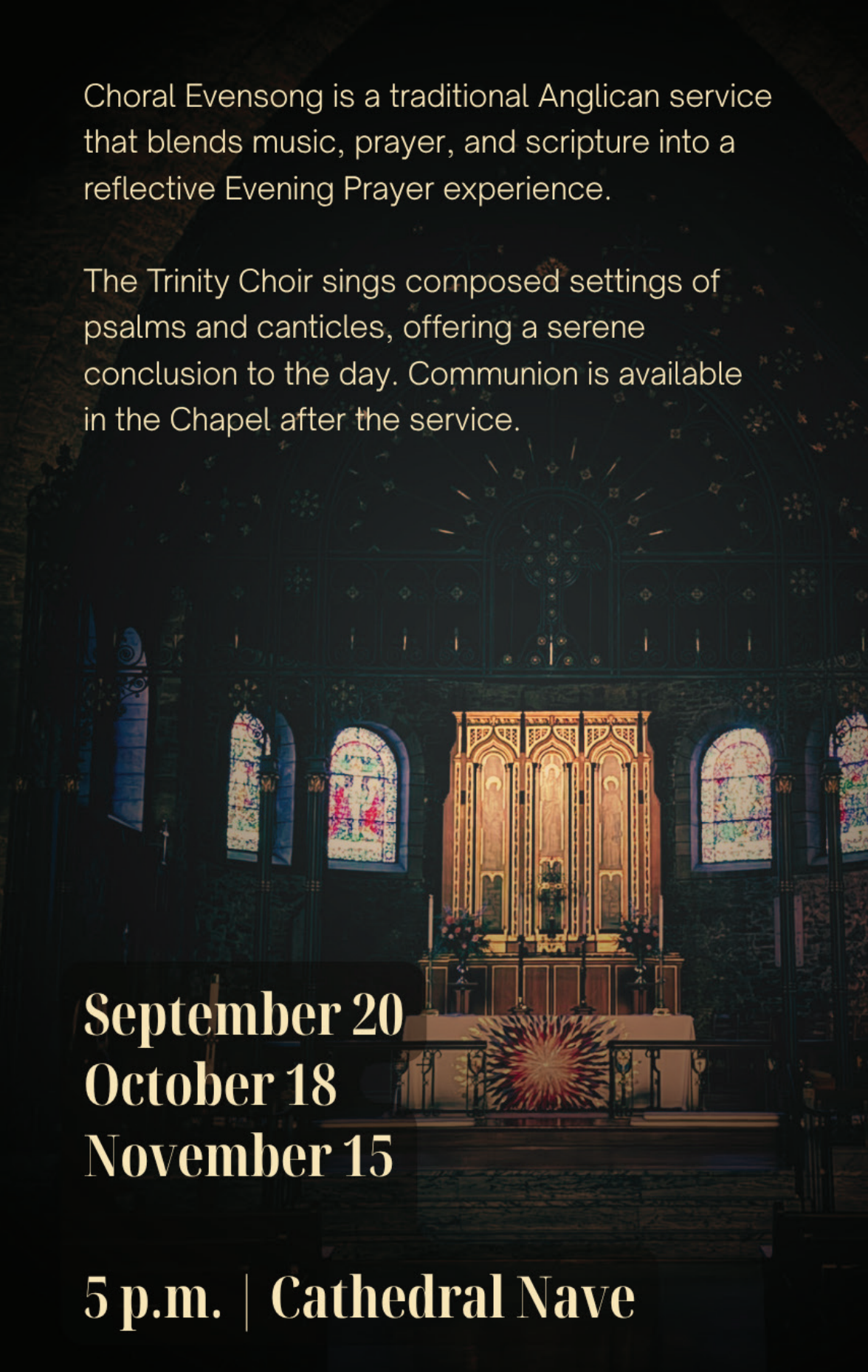

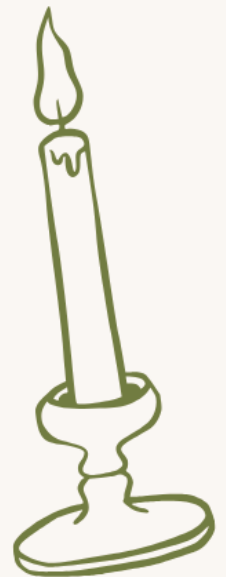
