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### From the Dean



It always seems strange to me when Easter comes early. Not that what we do is any different, Lent is still as long as usual and Holy Week is what it is every year, but it is still a bit strange. Maybe it's because we just aren't ready for Lent to begin and, by ready, I mean not in the right mood to examine ourselves and prepare for Easter. I feel like Christmas just happened and I'm still putting things away. It's too soon ... and yet it is here. In liturgical time, I tend to think of Christmas and Easter-the two biggest feasts of the year—as being spaced out in equal time from one another, but that is never the case. Because Easter is based on the lunar cycle, it can be as early as March 22 and as late as April 25, a big difference. Easter will come on March 31 this year. If the saying is true that March "comes in like a lion and out like a lamb," it seems fitting that the "lamb" coincides with Easter-even if it is early.

## Preparing for the Light

We will be offering Lenten programs again this year on Wednesday evenings from 6:30-7:45 p.m., followed by a joint service of Compline in the Nave. Our classes include a Lenten Journey with the St. John's Bible and a study on the Book of Jonah. Please read more about these classes in this edition of The Angelus. Wednesday classes will meet on Feb. 21, 28, Mar. 6, 13, and 20. Our observance of Lent will begin on February 14, Ash Wednesday, with three services being offered at 7 a.m., 12:05 p.m., and 7 p.m. for the imposition of ashes and Holy Eucharist. I hope you will come and join us this year as we move together on our journey through Lent to the joy of Easter.

Our services for Holy Week include our regular 8 a.m, 10:30 a.m., and 5 p.m. services on Palm Sunday and a 12:05 p.m. Holy Eucharist on Monday and Wednesday of that week. Tuesday will be our Diocesan Chrism Mass and Holy Eucharist at 11 a.m. The Maundy Thursday service will be at 7 p.m. with foot washing and the stripping of the Altar. Good Friday services will be at 9 a.m., with communion from the reserved sacrament, and 12:05 p.m. Holy Saturday will begin with a 9 a.m. service followed by decorating the Cathedral for Easter. The Easter Vigil will be that evening at 7 p.m. followed by a reception in Founders' Hall. The Bishop will be with us at the Vigil for baptisms, confirmations, reaffirmations, and receptions. Easter Day will include two festive celebrations of the Holy Eucharist at 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. There will not be a 5 p.m. service on Easter Day. Please see the full schedule listed in The Angelus.

Easter may be early this year, so let's prepare ourselves to receive it soon. Lent is almost upon us, but the light of Easter will not be far behind.

## **Growth and Learning**

This past year has been one of growth and learning, which began the first weekend in January, with the ordination of four transitional deacons, including the Cathedral's own Mtr. Brittany Sparrow-Savage.

We also had ordinations in June and July, including another one of our own members, Robin Rusconi. For each Ordination, I worked closely with the Diocesan Vocations Minister and the ordinands to develop the service according to their wishes and the Book of Common Prayer. I met with Holly, our Events Coordinator, to plan the reception and contacted the ordinand's home parishes for their participation as well.

Ordinations are a wonderful opportunity for members of the Cathedral to welcome and show hospitality to those from throughout the diocese. Each one of these services are one of the most important times in the life of the clergy member, and I am grateful to the many volunteers who step up to make the services a holy event. Moving forward, the plan is to have two ordinations a year, one in January and one in June or July. March brought my graduation from Clinical Pastoral Education at St. Luke's, and my appointment as the diocesan intake officer. As Intake Officer, I am responsible for receiving and analyzing information if a clergy member is suspected of any kind of misconduct.

In June, I was elected to serve as a board member of Nourish KC and currently serve on the governance committee. I learn more every day about the many efforts towards food rescue in the Kansas City metro area.

As the contact person for those requesting assistance with rent or utilities, my involvement and attendance at the monthly Kansas City Human Services committee has opened doors within the community regarding options for those who may need more services than the Cathedral can provide. The Human Services Committee is just a part of greater Kansas City's Coalition to End Homelessness.

Wow! What a year for our young people at the Cathedral. In the last year, our Youth have developed deeper relationships with the Word of God during our Formation hours. We have been walking through Lectio Divina as a community each week with the Gospel reading so they can be more comfortable reading, wondering and discerning what God is calling them to pay attention to in their lives and how to grow deeper in the mystery of faith.

In January last year, I attended the FORMA conference, a Christian educators conference within the Episcopal Church and learned a great deal about addressing mental health within the context of faith-based communities. We addressed mental health in September during Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. I could not be prouder of our youth for taking this conversation seriously and pastorally. As members of the Body of Christ and here at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral, you should be proud of how you have cared for these young people. It is because of you all they were ready to receive this information and receive it with compassionate hearts.

We also had a presence at Mega Camp, an Episcopal camp run by the Diocese of Kansas. At Mega camp, young people, grades 3–12 (must have completed third grade) are welcome to attend a week of fellowship, formation and fun. One of the beautiful things about this camp is it truly is a place where you see young people digging deeper into

their faith and growing in skills and emerging as leaders. The Diocese of West Missouri will be supporting and sending youth again this year in partnership with the Diocese of Kansas. 
## Flourishing







Common Ground Tuesdays 12:30–1:30 p.m. • Via Zoom



Sunday, March 24, 8 & 10:30 a.m., 5 p.m.	<b>Palm Sunday</b> —We recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem with the blessing of palms and a procession, followed by the story of Christ's Passion and death. The 10:30 service begins with a procession through the courtyard.
Monday, March 25, 12:05 p.m.	Monday in Holy Week—Holy Eucharist
Tuesday, March 26, 11 a.m.	<b>Tuesday in Holy Week</b> —Holy Eucharist & Chrism Mass with Bishop Diane Bruce.
Wednesday, March 27, 12:05 p.m.	Wednesday in Holy Week—Holy Eucharist
Thursday, March 28, 7 p.m.	<b>Maundy Thursday</b> —We remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples by listening to the gospel, participating in hymns and choral music, washing feet as a sign of servant ministry, and sharing the bread and wine of Eucharist. We witness the stripping of the altar.

**Easter Vigil**—Bishop Diane will be with us as we light the new fire, listen to the story of salvation in the Scripture and witness the confirmation, reception and reaffirmation of persons in the Cathedral congregation. We then proclaim with joy "Alleluia. Christ is risen" and celebrate the first Eucharist of Easter. We will continue the celebration at a reception following the service.

Sunday, March 31, 8 & 10:30 a.m.

**Easter Day**—We celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus. All services include hymns, choral music, brass and a Cathedral resplendent with flowers. Children will flower the resurrected Savior's cross.
